Enrolment Rules and Procedures

- 1. ! NEW! Mail-in registration cut-off is Friday, September 9, 2016, and registrations will be processed in the order in which they are received, mail-in and in-person registration combined, although late registrations will be considered if courses are not filled. Courses will be filled from late registrations in the order they are received, up to the second lecture, after which no further seats will be allocated. Late enrolments will be charged the full course fee. Class limits are as posted.
- 2. It is urged that all applicants list more than one course, in order of preference. If only one course is indicated and that course is already filled, the fee will be returned or the applicant may pick a class from any with space remaining.
- 3. If SSCL does not call you, you have been admitted to the class or classes which you indicated as your first choice. We will call you only if your class is already filled, or is cancelled. You do not need to call SSCL to confirm.

- 4. If a course is heavily oversubscribed, it may, with the instructor's consent or at the Board's discretion, be moved to a larger classroom, possibly off campus, or divided into two sessions. In such circumstances, applicants will be notified.
 - Classes are generally limited to the numbers stated in the course description and will be cancelled if enrolment is insufficient.
 - 6. No cancellation refunds will be made unless the applicant withdraws by the date of the first class scheduled for that course. In exceptional circumstances (e.g. illness), the Board will consider refunds of course fees.
 - Members may register in person on Wednesday, September 7, 2016 in Arts 217 at 10:00 am with a meeting to follow from 10:30 to 11:30 am.

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Course 1—France and Germany in the Nineteenth Century: A **Study in Contrasts**

France began the 19th Century with revolution; Germany ended it with a Unification that translated into a far more formidable revolution.

This course will examine France in the wake of Napoleon, as it struggled to find a new place in Europe, not to mention a form of government that would find consensus, and it will examine how German nationalism first awakened with the Romantic reaction to Napoleon, and then took shape under Otto von Bismarck.

The century began with the France defeating Prussia, the state that would unify Germany; that same century was transformed, when the very same state of Prussia, not only defeated France in 1870, but then created the German Empire in mid-January of 1871.

Dr. Burlingham has received high praise from SSCL members for his history classes.

Chemistry in the Laundry (+ other cleaning issues Chemistry of the Environment I: Earth and Air Chemistry of the Environment II: Fire and Water Chemistry Mistakes.

Students will be encouraged to read labels carefully and to report (for possible class discussion) uncertainties, errors, and omissions.

This course will <u>not</u> explore the chemistry of prescription drugs and other medicines, i.e. the Chemistry of the Medicine Cabinet will <u>not</u> be a topic for discussion here.

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Course 5—The Making of Power

While watching the American presidential campaign and other elections, it is interesting to look at techniques leaders have used in the past in order to shape a new path to power.

The class will study the reigns of rulers and groups in the past including Kaiser Augustus, the female rulers in the Renaissance, Louis XIV, Napoleon, mid 19th century English liberals, the conservative forces right before the first world war (especially Bismarck), artists after the first world war, Stalin, Hitler and cold war tacticians.

The class will focus primarily on how these rulers used imagery to forge bonds with larger groups in society. So the class will discuss art, architecture, film and advertising. Some written material would also be discussed.

Dr. Johansen's previous SSCL class was "Diaries of the Third Reich". She received excellent reviews from SSCL members.

Course 8—Hope in Dark Times: Camus + The U.S. Presidential Election: an Analysis

We live in a world defined and torn apart by fundamentalists, those who are convinced they know the truth and have an obligation to save non-believers from their errors.

On the one hand, there are the market fundamentalists, billionaire George Soros' term, who believe that a world without unions and interfering governments would be perfection. On the other hand, there are religious fundamentalists (take your pick). It seems as if there is no place for a moderate liberalism with a social democratic programme.

Albert Camus lived with such a divide, between Soviet Communism and American capitalism (an altogether kinder beast than market fundamentalism). He offered a middle way. For decades in eclipse, his thought is once again receiving close attention.

This course will look at his thought as well as that of another remarkable person, Vaclav Havel. It is highly recommended that you read The Plague by Camus.

At least one lecture will be devoted to an analysis of the November 8th U.S. Presidential election.

Dr. MacLeod is one of the most popular political studies teachers.
