



Publish Your Work in USURJ

Hey undergrads! Have you written a great research paper this past semester? If so, consider submitting your work to the <u>University of Saskatchewan Undergraduate Research Journal (USURJ)</u>. Submissions can include articles, reviews, artwork, and research snapshots.

<u>USURJ</u> is an open access, peer-reviewed scholarly journal featuring original artwork and scholarly articles by University of Saskatchewan undergraduate students. All submissions are reviewed by established experts in a relevant field. The journal is supported by the Office of the VP, Research and the University Library, including the Writing Centre. It is indexed in the DOAJ.

What does it publish?

- Original student work
 - All disciplines and professional colleges
 - Single or multi-authored
 - Co-authored (professors)
- · Artwork and photographs

- Multimedia
- Research papers
- Review papers
- Research Snapshots: provide a concise overview of students' ongoing work, its significance, and any preliminary results, but they can also take the form of a mini-analysis.

Tips for Quickly Verifying Online Information

When searching for information online or when you are simply scrolling through your social media feeds, it can be difficult to distinguish between credible information and false or misleading claims. Use these simple strategies to help you quickly sort fact from fiction (and everything in between).

Check Your Sources

When reading information online, determine the source, i.e. who created the information. Do not always take the website's About Us information at face value. It is important to check what others have to say about this person or organization. A quick Google search will often uncover clues to help you determine what biases might be present. Start using a technique called lateral reading, in your everyday practice when you come across sources unfamiliar to you. Before investing time in reading and evaluating the information (vertical reading), open a new tab and investigate the source (horizontal or lateral reading). Check out this video to learn more.

Trace the Claims

Much of what we encounter online has been stripped of context. Is what you are reading the original source of the information, or is this a republication or an interpretation of previously published work? If you are not examining the original source in context, open a new tab and go upstream to trace the claim, quote, or media back to the source. If the claim is about a research study, find the original article so you can see if the claims are presented accurately.

Facts Matter

Use a fact checker website to verify the accuracy of information you encounter online. Popular sites like Snopes, FactsCan (CDN), FactCheck.org (US), AFP Fact Check, and Politifact (US) are in the business of verifying claims and can help you quickly determine the veracity of the information.

Check Your Emotions

False news content is created to catch our attention and appeal to our emotions (anger, fear, outrage, etc.). Don't share posts that that are misleading based on your emotional reaction. Check your facts and check your emotions before sharing this kind of content. Remember, what you share online says a lot about you. Make a positive impression and think before you share or reshare information online. Is the information credible? Your posts tell others who you are and what you value. Also, before you share, think about who can see what you've posted (e.g. employer, friend, grandma), both now and in the future.
