

Wildfire smoke accelerates glacier melt, affects mountain runoff: USask research

As global temperatures rise, wildfires are becoming more common. A new study by University of Saskatchewan hydrology researchers found that exposure to wildfire smoke can cause glaciers to melt faster, affecting mountain runoff that provides major freshwater resources for life downstream.



<u>USask digital exhibit showcases dining</u> practices of ancient Romans

A new University of Saskatchewan digital exhibit is shedding light on dining and reclining practices dating back to 300 – 400 CE. The virtual exhibit, Cēna, is a project of USask's Museum of Antiquities, which is home to a collection of Greek, Roman, Egyptian and Near Eastern sculpture in full-scale

replica as well as original artifacts.

long celebration taking place for the first time.




By the numbers
