

# Gr. 4-5: Roman Mythology

Students will be learning about ancient Roman mythology and taking part in a storytelling activity with their classmates.

## **Learning Objectives**

Students will learn about ancient Roman culture and religion through myth, and take part in storytelling and reflection with their peers.

## **Lesson Outline**

90 minutes	Research time	Over the course of 2-3 classes.
30-60 minutes	Presentation time	
2 minutes	Explanation of activity	Myth worksheet
30 minutes	Independent activity	May also be done after the tour.
45 minute	Museum of Antiquities Tour	Optional

## **Additional Information**

#### **Activity:**

After going through the introductory PowerPoint on Roman mythology, continue the lesson by having the students research and tell one of the myths listed in the PowerPoint. Then, have the students fill out the activity sheet reflecting on the stories they were told.

#### Teacher Preparation:

Provide research materials for the students (laptops or books - you can adjusts the myths
on the PowerPoint to suit your students' needs and your school's resources).
Print activity sheet (PDF on MoA website)

#### **Tour Guide:**

• Active Listening, follow instructions, complete tasks, summarize and paraphrase, ask questions related to the oral presentation

#### **Assessment Guide:**

- Formative Assessment: Observations and Participation during PowerPoint lesson and discussion afterwards
- Assessment of Activity

• Students can summarize or paraphrase what was learned during the tour and the PowerPoint in an end-of-lesson activity (e.g., informational brochure, personal reflection, informational paper, descriptive narrative, presentation).
