

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH, M.A. THESIS PROPOSAL FORM

A Master's Thesis is a focused research project capable of being completed within the two years of the degree program. It should be approximately 80-100 pages, including Works Cited and Consulted. As an original study supported by a clear methodological and critical framework, the thesis is an opportunity to explore a topic, texts, and research questions in an informed way.

The M.A. Thesis Proposal is to be developed with the Supervisor and submitted with the completed M.A. Thesis Proposal form to the Graduate Chair for review by **31 May** of the first year of the M.A. Thesis degree. As an attachment to this form, the proposal should provide a 2-3 page overview of the research project and a 1-2 page bibliography.

Approval of the proposal does not bind the student to a given approach, nor does it cement the scope of the thesis unyieldingly. The final organization, argument, and conclusions of the thesis are the candidate's responsibility, in consultation with the Supervisor. If the approved subject is abandoned, a new proposal must be submitted.
