

Music & Wellbeing Virtual Conference:

The online Music and Wellbeing Conference, organized by **Dr. Jennifer Lang**, was scheduled for May 28-29, 2021 and was intended to unite researchers, community partners, educators, university students, and healthcare providers to explore and examine music and health intersections, and to facilitate knowledge mobilization of music's role and relevance in our lives during the best of times and worst of times. Our current climate of mental and physical uncertainty and unrest strongly suggests the need for communities of practice to gather with a focus on non-pharmacological and caring interventions for mental, emotion, social, and physical wellbeing. The understanding of the role of non-pharmacological solutions in health is paramount to sustaining positive cognitive, psychological, and physiological wellbeing in every age and stage of one's life and through fluctuating uncertainty of local and global socio-cultural situational factors.

There were several local community presenters (music therapists, music educators) as well as international speakers (from Spain, West Indies, U.S) presenting papers. We had a few alumni presenting and even some of our own undergraduate students presented, as they are connected to faculty research. Topics included music and dementia, empathy, street choirs, improvisation pedagogy, self-care practices, music and mental health with Canadian soldiers and more. Our featured speakers included:

*Dr. Daniel Levitin who is an award-winning neuroscientist, musician, and bestselling author. His research encompasses music, the brain, health, productivity, and creativity. Levitin has published more than 300 articles, in journals including Science, Nature, PNAS, The New Yorker, The Atlantic, and The Wall Street Journal. His research has been featured over 1900 times in the popular press. He is the author of four New York Times bestselling books: This Is Your Brain On Music, The World in Six Songs, The Organized Mind, and Successful Aging, as well as the international bestseller A Field Guide to Lies.

*Jacob Faithful who provided introductory sessions both days on Indigenous perspectives in music and wellbeing. Jacob is the leader of Young Spirit, a Grammy-nominated drumming group that sings in Plains Cree and has members throughout the Western U.S. and Canada.



Instead of a final concert, the ensemble engaged in a recording project performing 5 pieces over a four-day period, recording first live musicians together and then remote participants. Connecting to the Community During Covid:

Due to the pandemic, we converted our traditional Dept. of Music Open House into a virtual Open House, which then lead us to create virtual Self-Guided Open House tour, viewable <u>here</u>.

EDST – Music Student Teaching: The Covid-19 situation has been a challenge that we have collectively risen to. We want to thank the co-op teachers who have accommodated us so graciously. Without their help the music education students would have missed a key component to their degree and practical experience. Students were primarily placed in Saskatoon (Public, Catholic and Private School Divisions) but some were placed in cities from which the students resided, namely Lloydminster, Prince Albert, and Yorkton.

To supplement the EDST experience, five professional music educators provided online workshops from May 3-7. These clinicians included: 1) Retired and Free-lance Music/Band Teacher, **Nick Fanner** (*Fundamentally Flawed*); 2) Band/Orff/World Drumming/Arts Ed Teacher, **Richard Dubé** (*Engaging Your Older Students in Active Music Making; Indigenous Style Flute and World Music Drumming; Tips and Tricks for Effective Classroom Management*), 3) Associate Professor in Music Education, University of Western Ontario, **Cathy Benedict** (*Music and Social Justice: A Guide for Elementary Educators*); 4) Band/Arts Ed Teacher, **Michael Kurpjuweit** (Ukuleles and Technology – Teaching in 2021); 5) Choir/Vocal Jazz/Musical Theatre/Orchestra Teacher, **Cynthia Peyson Wahl** (*High School Choir IRL*).

USMES Professional Development Series: The University of Saskatchewan Music Educators' Society organized a professional development day for Music Education students. Two sessions were given by Kayleigh Skomorowski and Ian Krips.

Kayleigh Skomorowski – February 27, 2021:

Boys don't choose music ensemble participation when entering high school out of fear their masculinity and sexuality will be questioned. This research aims to prove that despite these obstacles and because of them boys have much to gain through participation in music programs in high school. Music provides a vehicle through which masculinity can be deconstructed and redefined therefore facilitating self-actualization.

Ian Krips – February 27, 2021:

I'm a member of the STF! Now what? This session provided an overview of the programs and services available to new teachers, including governance, contracts, labour supports, and professional supports.

High School Select Wind Orchestra:

The 18th annual HSSWO convened virtually this year, directed by co-conductors Dr. Glen Gillis and Dr. Darrin Oehlerking. This event involved over 60 high school students representing 23 schools from around the Province. The USHSSWO activities started in January where students participated in clinics by professional musicians/teachers from Saskatoon. Students also had the opportunity to meet and dialogue with the composers on Zoom - Paul Suchan and Cait Nishimura. One of the four pieces that the students received was a new commissioned work by alum Paul Suchan. Titled a *(H)armlessly (S)ensible and (S)incere (W)alk (O)utside*, the piece was tailored for the HSSWO Ensemble. The other pieces included: *Jenny* - Nick Myers (words by Ryan Kerr) arranged by Spencer Krips (U of S Music Dept graduate), *Into the Blue* by Cait Nishimura, and *Galope España* by Glen Gillis.

A special thank you to sound engineer, Wayne Giesbrecht from Media Productions who compiled all 60+ individual recordings for each of the 4 pieces, and worked with Glen Gillis to mix the final product.

PROGRAM UPDATES:

New Master of Music in Music Education degrees

The University of Saskatchewan Department of Music is pleased to announce a **new graduate degree** entitled **Master of Music in Music Education** and a **new M.Mus. Performance** degree in **Conducting**.

The **Master of Music in Music Education** degree will focus on the development of specific music educational philosophy and skill at the graduate level in a choice of Course-Based and Thesis-based streams. Students in the Course-Based stream will take 30 credit units including a 3-credit Capstone course (EMUS 911.3); students in the Thesis-Based stream will take 15 credit units plus a major thesis (EMUS 994).

The **Master of Music in Performance (Conducting)** is a project-based program consisting of 24 credit units and is designed to allow students to focus on repertoire, technique and leadership in a wind band or choral setting. Students will receive regular conducting lessons and have ample podium time with Department ensembles to hone and improve their skills. Large and small ensemble conducting will be available as part of the overall experience.

The video presentation also involved Wayne Giesbrecht (Media Productions at the U of S), and the trio's presentation included a prepared video of four selections, a live lecture component and a Q & A. Two U of S saxophone students were selected and involved in the NASA Region 9 Conference. 4th-year student **Ricardo Martins** performed the 4-movement *Shu Gath Manna* with electronic backtrack (Steven Galante) and 3rd-year student **Justin Filion** performed Diversion (Bernhard Heiden) in an interactive masterclass. Both saxophone students performed and represented the U of S Department of Music very well!

The *Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra* and artistic director **Dean McNeill** have put together a new initiative to allow young musicians to "play along" with the large jazz ensemble music of Saskatchewan composers. McNeill & the SJO are also working on a synesthesia-focused performance project in collaboration with SK-based composers Paul Suchan & Silas Friesen and U of S Art Professor Allyson Glenn.

Alumni Projects & Activities:



After completing his Master of Music in 2020, **Aaron Bueckert** has been creating multi-track instrumental videos for his YouTube channel. He has arranged music from popular artists and classical works, but the bulk of his arranging is of music from video games. His largest work, entitled <u>God Shattering Star</u>, was recently released and includes guest appearances from many other musicians, including a sizeable contingent of University of Saskatchewan students, alumni, and instructors.


