A Message from the Head

Words cannot adequality express the gratitude and appreciation I feel towards all of the hard working & talented people in our department, college and university. We made it through the second full year of the global pandemic. We returned to in person course offerings with low covid infection rates in our department specifically. Our ensembles and solo performers returned to making music in the community in thoughtful and engaging ways. We restarted many of our in-person outreach projects like Play-It-Forward, uSing uSask, and our High School Select-Wind Orchestra. We again hosted within our department (or we

will be hosting soon) many community-based music initiatives such as the Saskatoon Music Festival, Summer Strings camp, SaskTel Jazz Festival's Jazz Intensive summer camp, the Prairie Music Residency, and, the Strata New Music Festival. We even added a few new things like the MUAP Symphony Orchestra conducted by Shah Sadikov, the USASK String Fest organized by Dr. Veronique Mathieu (complete with sold out performances at the Diefenbaker Centre, featuring the Amati instruments). Dr. Jennifer Lang ran lead in the conversation that ultimately developed a new USASK Signature Area in Health and Wellness with the related pillar being Music, Arts and Wellbeing. We returned to students performing their wonderful graduation recitals in the wonderful Convocation Hall and we will continue to live stream many of our music events next Fall and beyond. We again delivered a terrific Fine Arts Research Lecture Series (i.e. FARLS). We had some great guest speakers visit our campus (e.g. Denise Gagné). We had many interactions with many cognate music organizations in town like the Saskatoon Symphony (with Greystones), Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra & Elixir Ensemble (faculty involved in performances), Saskatoon Youth Orchestra & Saskatoon Youth Jazz Orchestra (student involvement). We kept the quality of our research and artistic work inside the classroom, seminar space, academic and teaching/ learning spaces strong.

Our department is a community and we are in a community with many on and off campus partners, patrons, colleagues and friends.

It is inspiring and refreshing for me to hear and make some music in our department again and, although covid continues to remain a concern, I am very grateful for all the musical opportunities and contributions given and received by all in the department.

I am happy to report that, thanks to a generous donor bequeathment by the late Phillis Paul (UofS B.Mus. alumni) who left funds to our department, we will be able to upgrade our live streaming and video recording capabilities. This is a very exciting value-added opportunity for all in our department.



Alumni Spotlight: Maestra Tania Miller

"Music teaches us that there is creative potential in every moment waiting to respond to our energy and imagination."

Tania Miller

Saskatoon was incredibly lucky to celebrate the return of Maestra Tania Miller this Spring when she conducted the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra's penultimate concert of the 2021-22 season! Her masterful performance of Tchaikovsky's Symphony No 5 undoubtedly justified her reputation as an internationally acclaimed Canadian conductor and offered a heartfelt sense of homecoming for the city.

Before arriving is Saskatoon, Tania originally hailed from the rural town of Foam Lake, Saskatchewan, where she grew up with her parents and four brothers; her father played the accordion - her mother, the piano. Growing up in a small town, her only option for music lessons was a travelling piano teacher, Thelma Gillis, who would drive into Foam Lake three times a week to teach. Tania started learning piano and organ at eight-years-old and progressed quickly, becoming the local church organist and choir conductor by age thirteen. After deciding to become a concert pianist at age eleven, she auditioned on piano at the University of Saskatchewan in 1987. While attending the department, she studied piano with Cecile de Rousiers.

However, early on in her time at the university, Tania began to experience some chronic symptoms of tendonitis in her arms and had to readjust her career trajectory. "I spent years at the U of S doing physiotherapy to work around the tendonitis problem – but I never

Thus started Tania's illustrious career! After four years of conducting the Carmel Bach Festival, she went on to be an assistant and then associate conductor with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra before becoming the youngest conductor of a major Canadian orchestra when she took over the role of Music Director with the Victoria Symphony Orchestra, a position she held from 2004-2017.

conquered it. So I changed my passion from performance to music education." She graduated from the USASK Department of Music in 1991 with a Bachelor of Music Education degree and promptly became a music teacher in Outlook, Saskatchewan. Four years later, while attending a conducting workshop in Calgary, Tania was recognized by the clinician, Robert Reynolds, for her potential and was invited to study conducting with him at the University of Michigan. She would go on to receive both a masters and a doctorate in

After retiring from the Victoria Symphony with the title of Music Director Emerita, Tania embarked on a successful freelance career, guest conducting throughout Canada, the United States, and Europe. Some of her more recent engagements include working with the L'Orchestre Symphonie de Quebec, the Vancouver Symphony, and the London Symphonia. Her writings on music have been featured in numerous publications, including

Symphony Magazine, The Globe and Mail, and Better Humans. She has also received many prestigious accolades such as an Honorary Doctors of Laws from Royal Roads University, an Honorary Fellowship Diploma from the Royal Conservatory of Music, and the Friends of Canadian Music Award from the Canadian League of Composers.

After such a stellar career, Tania has never forgotten the University of Saskatchewan, offering the following epitaph in honour of the time she spent here:


"My time studying at the U of S was inspiring to me. I came from a small community, and the U of S showed me my first moments of conducting, my first experience in a high-level wind band, and Marvin Eckroth and Don Harris inspired me to strive to be a good teacher. Out of the experiences of performing in the ensembles, attending and performing recitals and the friendships that I made there, I feel that I gained the confidence that I needed to feel that I could belong to the Saskatchewan music and music education community. Little did I know that this was only the beginning, but what a beginning it was because this community was so passionate and vibrant! I had so many mentors and people that inspired me and everyone around me seemed so excited about music and truly interested in teaching. My best friends are still those people that I studied with at the U of S and I'm grateful for the experiences and quality of education I had there."

The Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra, under the direction of Professor Dean McNeill, presented the first concert of the season and appropriately titled "Back in the Swing of Things" and featured repertoire that included both classic and contemporary composers. Local Saskatoonbased vocalist Graham Dyck joined the orchestra on stage. The holidays saw the SJO ringing in the season and celebrating with their annual holiday December concert "Make A Joyful Noise," featuring vocalists SK-based singer/songwriter Eileen Laverty, Dr. Jennifer Lang, 4th-year B.Mus. student Kate Nachilobe, and guest conductor Mr. Nick Fanner. On May 13th, the SJO continued to get its groove back by diving headfirst into "The Fab Four & More: Beatles for Big Band," featuring a sensational blend of classic and reimagined iconic Beatles tunes. The SJO was joined by guests Ray Baril, Allan Gilliland and Stacey Mortenson-Spokes, as well as Canadian guitar legend Robert Walsh. The SJO season will culminate on Friday, June 17th with a concert like no other, "Dimensions in Sound," a multisensory orchestral experience that explores the visual soundscapes of acclaimed visual artist USASK Art Professor Allyson Glenn. The concert will include Grammy Award winning drummer Larnell Lewis and feature music by Saskatchewan composers. Paul Suchan and Silas Friesen. This show will also premiere original music matched to Allyson's original visual art, all of which has been created exclusively for this concert.



The 19th Annual USASK High School Select Wind Orchestra took place on March 4-6th under the direction of Dr. Glen Gillis. This event involved 69 high school students representing 20 schools from around the province. MMus saxophone student Ricardo Martins was featured along with two compositions by Glen Gillis, "Creature" and "Space Walk." The highlight of the concert was a new commission by Paul Suchan titled "Diamond Tones for Aerophones."

The USask Saxophone Workshop, organized by Dr. Glen Gillis, took place on Saturday March 26th in Quance Theatre. The workshop was open to saxophonists of all ages with a minimum of one year of experience. The day culminated with the guest saxophonist attendees performing with the USASK Saxophone Ensemble. 
Department of Music Open House:

Kieran Foss is grateful to have found a home in the University of Saskatchewan's Department of Music! Originally from the UK, Kieran has lived in cities across Canada, arriving in Saskatoon in the Fall of 2021. Kieran holds master's degrees in both vocal performance and musicology from the University of Victoria and a bachelor's degree in vocal performance from the University of Ottawa. As both a vocalist and a scholar, Kieran focuses on bringing a well researched approach to every performance. In 2020, Kieran was grateful to receive funding from the Social Science and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) to continue his research into medieval English liturgical music.
