Keynote Address: Dr. Sealy Gilles

John Donne, Esi Edugyan, and the Medieval Leper: Eclecticism in the Age of Specialization

Dr. Sealy Gilles is an Emerita Associate Professor from the English Department at Long Island University, Brooklyn, New York. She has published on early medieval geography, Anglo-Irish colonialism, and John Manly and Edith Rickert's edition of *The Canterbury Tales*. Her current work centres on cultural responses to epidemic disease in the Middle Ages. Her most recent publication, "Doctrinal Dermatologies" a chapter in the collection *Writing on Skin in the Age of Chaucer*, 2018 examines early and late medieval imaginings of the "leper" in the context of Biblical and patristic antecedents. She is working on a study of the shifting characterisations of Hansen's disease in the Middle English romance, *Amis and Amiloun*.
