

The inclined plane has an angle  $\theta = 30.0^{\circ}$  with the vertical. The hanging object has mass  $m_1 = 5.00$  kg. The inclined plane is coated with a layer of ice so that friction between the mass  $m_2$  and the inclined plane is negligible.



(a) Calculate the tension in the string. (3 marks)

- B2. A rocket is launched straight up from rest. It accelerates upward with a constant acceleration of 30.0 m/s<sup>2</sup> for 30.0 seconds. At t = 30.0 s the rocket is out of fuel and the rocket engine is no longer exerting a force on the rocket. You may ignore any effects due to air resistance and you may assume that the value of g does not change appreciably during the flight of the rocket.
  - (a) Calculate the altitude of the rocket at time t = 30.0 s. (3 marks)

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(b) Calculate the maximum altitude that the rocket reaches. (5 marks)



- B3. A satellite moves in a stable circular orbit around the Earth at a speed of  $5.52 \times 10^3$  m/s.
  - (a) Calculate the height of the satellite above the Earth's surface. (4 marks)



$$h = \frac{(6.674 \times 10^{-11} \text{N·m}^2/\text{kg}^2) \times 5.98 \times 10^{24} \text{kg}}{(5.52 \times 10^3 \text{m/s})^2} - 6.38 \times 10^6 \text{m} = 6.72 \times 10^6 \text{m}$$

(b) Calculate the magnitude of the acceleration due to gravity at the satellite's location. If you did not obtain an answer for (a) use a value of  $7.25 \times 10^6$  m. (3 marks)

$$Q = \frac{U^2}{\Gamma} = \frac{(5.52 \times 10^3 \text{m/s})^2}{1.31 \times 10^7 \text{m}}$$

(c) Calculate the orbital period of the satellite. If you did not obtain an answer for (a) use a value of  $7.25 \times 10^6$  m. (3 marks)

- B4. A pendulum is made from a ball, of mass m = 0.500 kg, attached to a string of length L = 55.0 cm. As the ball swings through the lowest point in its motion, the tension in the string is exactly two times the weight of the ball.
  - (a) Draw a free body diagram for the ball when at the lowest point in its motion. (2 marks)



(b) Calculate the speed of the ball at the lowest point in its motion. (\*marks\*)
