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- B3. The upper thigh bone in the human body (the femur) can be modeled as a cylinder of length 48.0 cm and diameter 2.35 cm for an adult male. The cylinder contains a core of bone marrow, of diameter 2.13 cm, which does not contribute to the mechanical strength of the bone. The outer part of the bone has a Young's Modulus of 9.40×10<sup>9</sup> Pa for compressive forces. Half of the weight of the human upper body, a force of 255 N, pushes down on top of the femur.
  - (a) Calculate the effective cross sectional area of the femur on which the force acts. (4 marks)


